 \mathcal{A} s part of a community service project, Somerset County Vocational & Technical High School students Ritu Peddinti of Bridgewater, Michelle Masiello of Hillsborough and Mira Amin of Bridgewater have been raising awareness of neurofibromatosis and fundraising for the Children's Tumor Foundation.

The Children's Tumor Foundation supports research for neurofibromatosis and the families who are affected by it. Neurofibromatosis is a type of cancer that causes tumors to grow on nerves throughout the body. Over the past year, the students have raised over \$1,000 for the Foundation by selling bracelets and hosting fundraising dinners.

"One of the most successful dinners we had was at Chipotle, where people could bring in flyers, and 50% of their profits would be donated to our project; we earned \$108.25 from that fundraiser," said Ritu Peddinti. Ritu went on to add, "Another successful dinner took place at our school's Trade Wins Restaurant, where we presented a slideshow about neurofibromatosis to over 30 people and raised awareness for our cause."

Additionally, as part of their project, the team participated in a neurofibromatosis walk and have been in contact with a director at the Children's Tumor Foundation in order to create gift baskets. "These baskets will contain different crafts and DIY kits that the kids can use to decorate their hospital rooms," Ritu explained.

In April, the students' project will culminate with the team competing at the New Jersey SkillsUSA Championships in the community service category, where they will be showcasing the work they've done over the course of the year.*
