Somerset County Vocational & Technical High School students Janum Shah of Belle Mead and Aromal Suresh of Bridgewater have been named Semifinalists in the 2019 National Merit Scholarship Program. Approximately 16,000 Semifinalists were named in the 64th annual Program. The two academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth more than \$31 million that will be offered next Spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship* award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to their finalist standing. About half of the finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholarship* title.

In addition to the Semifinalists, the National Merit Scholarship Program named Molly Foster of Flemington, Mahima Gurushankar of Bridgewater, Robert Kramer of Branchburg and Sonia Purohit of Branchburg as Commended Students. A Letter of Commendation from the school and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), which conducts the Program, will be presented by the principal to these scholastically talented seniors.

The National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), a not-for-profit organization that operates without government assistance, was established in 1955 specifically to conduct the annual National Merit Scholarship Program. Scholarships are underwritten by NMSC with its own funds and by approximately 410 business organizations and higher education institutions that share NMSC's goals of honoring the nation's scholastic champions and encouraging the pursuit of academic excellence.*

As part of the annual Week of Respect (October 1-5 in 2018) and in accordance to the Anti-Bullying Bill of Rights Act (P.L.2010, c.122), SCVTHS welcomed motivational speaker Nick Tokman of Discovery Channel's "Deadliest Catch." Mr. Tokman spoke of dealing with negative influences, peer pressure, overcoming adversity and leveraging failure for success.

Building on the success of last year's Week of Respect, the Friends of Rachel Club members continued projects which aim to "foster a permanent culture of kindness and compassion" within the school. The Friends of Rachel Club was created in memory of Rachel Joy Scott, who was the first person killed in the Columbine High School shooting on April 20, 1999.

Additionally, the Linkages Department (funded by the NJ Department of Children and Families) at SCVTHS held events during all lunch periods on October 19th to mark

National School Violence Awareness Week. Students were encouraged to visit the Linkages literature table for information on violence prevention, peer mediation, coping skills and friendship building. Students were also able to submit drawings and ideas for school approval to paint additional bricks on the school's "Wall of Peace."

As part of a yearly presentation, students in Ms. Deb Gichan's Photography classes created black and white anti-HIB (harassment, intimidation, and bullying)
