
n an effort to offer students a wide range of educational choices, increase employability, and adjust to the ever-changing technology landscape, the Cisco Program at SCVTHS has been expanded into Integrated Technology Systems. Students in this program will still receive a basic education and instruction in Cisco with a Cisco Certified Entry Networking Technician (CENT) emphasi. The Integrated Technology Systems Program puts a larger

focus on structured cabling, Honeywell burglar and fire alarms, security cameras and home automation. By studying these additional components, students will have a greater range of knowledge, which in turn will help them to be more qualified for the jobs they desire. Integrated Technology Systems Instructor Paul Brinkmann believes that the changes to the Program will no doubt benefit the students by diversifying their skills and knowledge.

Because of the adjustments made in the curriculum of the new Program, SCVTHS will graduate students who are a step ahead of most other candidates entering the field. By having the knowledge base of electronic systems and networking, students graduating from the SCVTHS Integrated Technology Systems Program will ultimately require less initial training for a variety of jobs.
